CIS Partners with UNDA

Te Kupenga - Catholic Theological College (CTC) currently teaches the Bachelor of Theology degree as an offshore campus of the Catholic Institute of Sydney (CIS). Last week CIS have officially announced that they are moving its civil accreditation from the Sydney College of Divinity to the University of Notre Dame, Australia. They have advised all their students and stakeholders that "the Catholic Institute of Sydney (CIS) will be changing its civil accreditation partner from the Sydney College of Divinity (SCD) and will be partnering with the University of Notre Dame, Australia (Notre Dame) to deliver recognised programs accredited by the University. This change will begin to take effect from the beginning of 2022."

This directly affects 33 of our students who are studying for that award. Indirectly it also affects the 20 students studying for our Graduate Diploma in Theology as the papers that award is composed of are the same papers as the BTh. The Catholic Theological College wants to maintain its link

with CIS and (eventually) to teach the University of (UNDA) Notre Dame award. At present we have the SCD BTh registered on the NΖ National Qualifications Framework and we have commenced the process of getting the new **UNDA** award registered on the Framework.

Support Life Sunday

The theme of Support Life Sunday on 10 October is "Supporting and honouring health carers." This year's focus acknowledges the work of health carers, including family carers and health professionals, who are on the front line in supporting and protecting life.

Health carers are witnesses to the ongoing impact on health and life of poverty, exclusion, attitudes towards disabilities, and addictions.

This year's Support Life Sunday resources share the stories of health carers who are examples of people who support life in their homes, jobs and careers.
