The title above may not be conducive to the hard evidence of student achievement required at the end of an academic year that has been a Covid-fuelled antidote self-improvement. against intention is to offer a reminder that the journey our students are on is often not apparent. This observation may prompt a teacher to cast lofty achievement aims and objectives against a broader tableau that can be difficult to paint.
