## **New Appointment**

Congratulations to Kelly Ross on her appointment as the new Vicar for Education of the Catholic Archdiocese of Wellington. Kelly was formerly the Secondary Religious Education Coordinator and Catechetical Studies Coordinator for the diocese. She is also one of our L5/6 lecturers.

The Vicar for Education is the Archbishop's representative appointed to exercise local

jurisdiction in "all things" pertaining to Catholic Education. In addition to exercising the ordinary powers which belong to the Archbishop in matters relating to Catholic education in the Archdiocese, the Episcopal Vicar:

- oversees the educational activities of the Catholic Schools Education Services (formerly Catholic Education Centre);
- carries out the proprietorial responsibilities of the Archbishop as member of the Council of Proprietors of Catholic Integrated Schools, and the Association of Proprietors of Integrated Schools;
- engages in negotiations with the regional and national offices of the Ministry of Education in relation to Archdiocesan schools' Integration Agreements, and initiates research and planning for their further development;
- monitors maintenance and strengthening of the Catholic character of the schools.




### Workshop on Te Tiriti o Waitangi

On 8th July, staff from Te Whanganui-a-Tara / Wellington Te Kupenga office, along with colleagues from other Te Whanganui-a-Tara / Wellington-based and Papaioea / Palmerston North-based organisations attended a day-long workshop on Te Tiriti o Waitangi at the Home of Compassion in Tapu Te Ranga / Island Bay. The day was facilitated by Victoria Owen from Groundwork. Groundwork work alongside organisations who want to improve their understanding of Te Tiriti o Waitangi and create systemic, enduring change in order to eliminate systemic injustice in all its manifestations. Groundwork help those they work with to better understand the history of Aotearoa New Zealand and, as a result, to better understand modern-day relationships and modern-day life in our country. Core to this work is responding to the questions, "How might we, those of non-Māori descent, be the honourable people, tangata tiriti, that the rangatira



thought they were entering into relationship with in 1840?" and "How might we make tangible and real a world that holds true to Te Tiriti o Waitangi?"

### **Sacred Ordination to Priesthood**



Fr Isaac Fransen was ordained by Hamilton Bishop Stephen Lowe at the Cathedral of the Blessed Virgin Mary on 17 July. Fr Isaac entered the Holy Cross Seminary and studied at CTC in 2015.
