

Foundation Course For Teachers New To Catholic Schools

In late January, 29 primary and secondary school teachers new to Catholic schools attended "Whakataki Ki Ngā Kura O Te Hahi Katorika: Introduction to Catholic schools", run by the Catholic Theological College and the Catholic Diocese of Hamilton. The first day of the course covered Catholic Special Character, expectations of teachers in a Catholic School, the background to Catholic education in Aotearoa New Zealand, the roles of the DRS, principal, tagged teachers, preference, and the culture, climate, and community of a Catholic school, and Bible basics.

Teachers from a number of secondary subject areas also took part; science, mathematics, English, hard materials, social studies. They were joined by primary school teachers and support staff. Days two and three will be held later in the first term.

The three-day course introduces teachers to the five categories for certification for teachers, Catholic Character, Scripture, Theology, Religious Education, and Spirituality. We hope it will better prepare teachers for CTC's level five NZ Certificate in Christian Studies - Religious Education courses. To make it easier, those attending had a choice of two venues, either Tauranga or Hamilton.

Outcome 1: Learner wellbeing and safety system

Outcome 2: Learner voice

Outcome 3: Safe, inclusive, supportive, and accessible physical and digital learning environments

Outcome 4: Learner wellbeing and safety

Outcome 8: Responding to the distinct wellbeing and safety needs of international students

Outcome 9: Prospective international tertiary students are well informed

Outcome 10: Offer, enrolment, contracts, insurance, and visa

Outcome 11: Appropriate orientation, information, and advice for international students.
