## CTC Staff Feature

Know more about your lecturers and staff. In this issue, we talked to Fr Bernard and here is a summary of his personal and professional background.

I am of Catholic Chinese parentage, born in Singapore in 1952, and had my first Catholic school experiences with the Marist Brothers who run the Catholic High School, followed by a longer period with the Brothers of St. Gabriel with whom I completed my A-level of education. Those were important years for my faith formation as the religious brothers and teachers taught me how to have special concerns for the poor and suffering through our social activities. Above all, they also taught me to cultivate a deep spirit of prayer as an integral part of my life in the service of others. These early formative years, especially the life of St. Francis Xavier, inspired me to want to become a missionary with a missionary religious community, but working in the region of Malaysia and Singapore.

I made the decision to join the Redemptorists in 1971. A major part of my formation was done with the Redemptorists in Bangalore, India from 1975-79. Those were the most exciting and fruitful years of my life as a religious as they prepared me for the challenges of priestly and missionary ministries after my ordination. After my ordination in mid-1979, I spent some years in formation and mission work in Malaysia and

Singapore, and helped introduce the RCIA into the Singapore Archdiocese. In 1985, I started my postgraduate studies in moral theology at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., obtaining my doctorate in 1989. In 1991, I began teaching at the Yarra Theological Union in Melbourne, Australia. In the intervening years, I had spent short stints teaching in Singapore and Davao in the Southern Philippines as well. About 5 years ago, my community sent me to Auckland to be a resource person and also to be part of the young international Redemptorist mission team together with our Kiwi confreres here. Currently I commute between Melbourne and Auckland.

As for my favourite scripture passage, I love particular the story of the Woman at the well in Chapter 4 of John's Gospel. In fact, I made the saying of Jesus to her as to how I would want to live my life as an ordained minister – "the Water that I shall give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life"

The people I have great admiration for at this point of my life are Nelson Mandela, Gandhi, the Rev Dr. Martin Luther King, Pope John XXIII, and Pope Francis. My view is that people like these belong to the Beatitudes as proclaimed in the Sermon on the Mount

If I were to be asked about one Rule for living, I would say with great modesty: Live life to the fullest with simplicity, respect, thanksgiving, and deep gratitude to God for the extraordinary gifts of nature with their diversities of personalities and life.
